WHY IS THIS IMPORTANT?

80% of brain development occurs in the first five years of a child's life. What happens in these early years has a lasting impact - from kindergarten readiness to third-grade reading scores to high school graduation and beyond.

Reading is the most crucial academic skill because it is the foundation for learning. Through third grade children are learning to read; after third grade students read to learn. Without a strong foundation in reading, children are left behind at the beginning of their education and are 4 times more likely not to graduate from high school than children who read at grade level at the end of third grade.

That's why United Way of Southern Maine mobilizes the ideas, expertise, and resources of more than 300 partners and thousands of individuals to close gaps in early childhood development so that more children have the foundation they need to thrive today and in the future.


