From Kittery to Freeport, from Sanford to Bridgton, United Way of Southern Maine (UWSM) mobilizes our community to action so all can thrive. With deep local roots in Southern Maine, we see how our community's greatest challenges like food insecurity, housing instability, and lack of access to child care and health services are connected, and how we can bring people and resources together to address them.

That's what we do: bring the community together to create a future where more kids have a strong start, our neighbors thrive - not just survive, and we all live longer, better lives.

Thanks to the support of thousands of local individuals and organizations, UWSM will invest \$6,769,279 in Southern Maine in United Way-led work and 83 innovative programs and collaborations at 61 community partners. These investments increase the availability of highquality child care, connect people with educational and employment opportunities, improve access to better healthcare, and more.




ALICE IN SOUTHERN MAINE

Every day, 38% of households in Southern Maine make tough choices such as deciding between quality child care and paying the rent. This includes 8% of households living below the federal poverty level and another 30% known as ALICE - Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed.

ALICE represents the growing number of households who are unable to afford Sources: ALICE Threshold, 2022; American Community Survey, 2022 the basics. They span all ages, genders, races, and ethnicities. They work as our teachers, child care providers, health care professionals, retail workers, and more. Typically, ALICE works full-time at low-wage jobs; sometimes working multiple part-time jobs trying to cobble together enough for a survival budget.

Ultimately, ALICE workers are the engine that makes our economy - and our daily lives - run smoothly. Yet, they live paycheck to paycheck, and have little to no opportunity to save for emergencies or for future investments like education, home ownership, or retirement.

The following investment portfolio highlights United Way of Southern Maine's focus on community investments, public policy, United Way-led programming, and volunteer work to help ALICE households rise.

WHY IS THIS IMPORTANT?

Healthy development and quality early learning experiences from birth to age 8, whether in formal or informal learning environments, prepare children to enter kindergarten ready to learn and reach reading proficiency by the end of third grade, a critical benchmark in assuring student success.

Through third grade children are learning to read; after third grade students read to learn. Without a strong foundation in reading, children are left behind at the beginning of their education and are four times more likely not to graduate from high school than children who read at grade level at the end of third grade.

The entire community plays a role in and benefits from transforming children into educated, healthy, independent adults. UWSM unites schools, businesses, community organizations, and individuals to support school readiness and reduce barriers for historically disadvantaged children.


